

In Conversation with Arike Oke

Film London Chief Executive Adrian Wootton OBE in conversation with Arike Oke, Executive Director, Knowledge and Collections, British Film Institute.

Arike Oke is a noted cultural leader, a registered archivist, and curator. She is Executive Director of Knowledge and Collections at the British Film Institute. Formerly she was the Managing Director for Black Cultural Archives, the home of Black British history.

Arike has worked in heritage for over 15 years, from the seminal Connecting Histories project in Birmingham, to developing Wellcome Collection's archive, and co-convening Hull's first official Black History Month. Her fiction is published in magazines and anthologies. Her critical art writing has been featured in The Girls Are and This is Tomorrow. Her academic writing has appeared in journals. She has written an anti-racism book for children to be published in 2022.
